Living Our Faith: Meet Vicki

An SFX parishioner since: 1988. I had attended Mass in the lower church at SFX in the '70s, and was drawn back years later when I was looking for a parish that integrated faith into daily life. College Church walked the talk. Ignatian spirituality inspired me and came to life through the parish's commitment to social justice, the ministries, and the homilies and music. I joined SFX and found my spiritual home.

Living my faith: My faith journey has taken me from College Church to Kenya, Central America, New York, and many parts of St. Louis. Initially, through College Church, I was a St. Vincent DePaul Society volunteer. We assisted our neighbors in many ways – from tutoring to providing meals and financial help – and forged partnerships with the great folks at Washington Tabernacle and Third Baptist churches. In 1998, I joined the Maryknoll Lay Missioners (MKLM) and will never forget my “parish sending” as Father Len Kraus and parishioners gathered around the altar to bless me as I embarked for Kenya. I learned a little Swahili and worked with street kids and orphans in Nairobi for three-and-a-half years, and later moved to New York as MKLM's Director of Mission Services.

Upon returning to St. Louis in 2006 I became SFX's Director of Social Ministry. This was an energizing period of growth and globalization of our parish, including the expansion of the ID and Birth Certificate Outreach Program, the start of Winter Inn, and the beginning of our Sister Parish relations in Guatemala and, later, St. Peter Claver in Belize. Today, I continue to volunteer on the Fair Trade and Sister Parish Committee and actively participate in the Ignatian Volunteer Corps (IVC) by providing interpretation services for attorneys at Catholic Legal Assistance Ministries.

Why I'm involved: The influence of the Sisters of Loretto, Maryknoll and the Jesuits has been formational and is central to who I am. I have grown up in the Jesuit world: I attended graduate school at SLU, was on the SFX staff for five years and a parishioner for 36 years, and have been a leader and active in the IVC for more than eight years. I currently serve on the boards of The Encuentro Project and MKLM. In Ignatian terms, I guess you could say I strive to be a “woman for others,” and I do so with a great sense of gratitude for the blessings and love I have received.

Three words that describe SFX: Community, Inspirational, Formational.

My neighborhood: I love city life in SOHA (South Hampton), where I've lived since my return from Kenya. But I claim all of St. Louis as my hometown. I've lived in Creve Coeur, Des Peres and Webster Groves, where I raised my family and could walk to our parish (Holy Redeemer), my high school (Nerinx Hall) and my undergraduate school (Webster College, as it then was called). I've taught Spanish at DuBourg, Ursuline, Nerinx and SLU.

Fun facts: I've retired -- three times, in fact – but I'm still volunteering and spending time outdoors pursuing my love of vegetable gardening, flowers and birds. Travel is another passion, and I'll be going to Scandinavia and Iceland this summer. My life and heart are full: I have a wonderful son and daughter who live in Napa, California and a granddaughter who is a junior at Western Washington University in Bellingham; I'm a five-time cancer survivor; I'm amazed and so happy to be alive and eager to see what's next.

Antiracism at College Church

At College Church, antiracism is an expression of our recognition that all are created in the image of God. As such, we respond—personally and collectively—to the call to identify, and to actively challenge, structures and systems that devalue people on the basis of race, and to practice restoration in the pursuit of justice.

May is Asian/Pacific Heritage Month

In 1979, Congress established Asian/Pacific American Heritage Week. On May 14, 1991, George H. W. Bush expanded that recognition by signing into law the first Asian/Pacific American Heritage Month. Continuing the celebration of Asian/Pacific Americans' contributions to society, this legislation also recognized significant dates within the month. May 7, 1843, marks the arrival of the first Japanese immigrants to the United States. On May 10, 1869, the transcontinental railway was completed—a feat largely accomplished through the work of Chinese immigrants.

As we honor the many contributions made by people of Asian/Pacific Island descent, it is important to note that this term, created in 1990 as part of the US census, represents numerous countries of origin, languages, and distinct cultures. This month we will highlight some of the individuals from these communities and the related events that enrich our nation and our Church.

A Force for Good

Dr. Carolyn Y. Woo was born and raised in Hong Kong. She immigrated to the U.S. to attend Purdue University where she received her bachelor's, master's, and doctoral degrees. Her Ph.D. is in Strategic Management. Two years after graduating Woo was hired as a professor at Purdue. Eventually, she became associate executive vice president for academic affairs.



Then she served as dean of the Mendoza College of Business at the University of Notre Dame for fourteen years. During her tenure, Mendoza College was recognized as the nation's leading business school in ethics education and research. The school also received top ranking from Bloomberg Businessweek. In addition, Woo was the first female dean to chair the accreditation body for business schools.

From 2004 to 2010, Dr. Woo served on the Board of Directors for Catholic Relief Services which is the international humanitarian agency of the Catholic church. In 2012, she was elected its president and

CEO. The magazine Foreign Policy listed her among the 500 Most Powerful people on the planet and one of 33 in the category "a force for good." In 2015, Woo was a presenter in Rome when Pope Francis' encyclical on the environment was released. Her book, "Working for a Better World," (Our Sunday Visitor) describes her personal faith journey and her work at CRS.

After five years she retired from Catholic Relief Services and is once again at Purdue University as Distinguished President's Fellow for Global Development. In that position she assists various international collaborative efforts.

Woo is married and has two sons. She has received honorary doctorates from Providence College, the University of St. Francis, Lewis University, and Notre Dame. Boards she currently serves on include Catholic Charities USA; the University of Portland; and University of Notre Dame Australia. She also serves on the Independent Child Abuse Review Board for the Archdiocese of Baltimore, and the US conference on Migration & Refugee Services. Her latest book is titled, "Rising: Learning from Women's Leadership in Catholic Ministries" (Orbis, 2022).

Significant Figures in Racial History

Mary Eliza Mahoney – born May 7, 1845, in Boston, MA. Mahoney was the first professionally trained African American nurse in the U.S. She helped create the National Association of Colored Graduate Nurses to improve access to nursing education and to raise standards of living among Black RNs. Mahoney was inducted into the American Nurses Association Hall of Fame, and the National Women's Hall of Fame.

Phillis Wheatley – born May 8, 1753, in West Africa. Wheatley was kidnapped, sold into slavery at age 7, and bought by the Wheatley family of Boston. After learning to read and write her poetic talent was recognized. Her publication, "Poems on Various Subjects, Religious and Moral," made her famous and she was emancipated. She married and had three children all of whom died young. Wheatley died in poverty and obscurity at age 31.

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Mary Lou Williams – born May 8, 1910, in Atlanta, GA. Williams taught herself to play the piano at age 3 and helped support her family by playing at parties.

She worked with Dizzy Gillespie and others and recorded many albums. A Roman Catholic, her music compositions include a setting of the Mass and other sacred pieces. Williams spent her later life aiding fellow musicians who were addicted to alcohol and heroin.

Openings on the SFX Pastoral Council

The St. Francis Xavier (College) Church Pastoral Council is a group composed of the Parish Life Coordinator (Director of the Work) and twelve active parishioners who meet regularly to deliberate, reflect, and make decisions on a variety of issues related to the operations, programming, and spiritual life of the parish. The Pastoral Council provides support and direction to the various parish Commissions and Committees, and is generally charged with making sure that all activities support the parish’s mission.

There are **four openings** on the Pastoral Council for the term starting in August 2024. Council members serve for a three-year term with the option to serve a second term. The group meets one Saturday morning per month, and also participates actively in various special events throughout the year.

Process

Interested parishioners can submit a short statement explaining their interest in serving on the Council answering the following three questions: (1) What has drawn you to SFX College Church, and what are your hopes for the future of the parish? (2) What background and experience, either professional, personal, or as a parishioner, would you bring to the Council and how would you apply it? (3) Do you foresee any obstacles that would prevent you from regularly attending Council meetings and, from time to time, assisting with special projects or events? Are there scheduling or other accommodations that would make participation easier for you? Katie Jansen or another council member will meet with each applicant to discern with the nominee whether or not they would be a good fit for the council.
