Reflection

Making Space or Taking Space

A few weeks ago, a group of young adults entered College Church to protest the concluding Mass for Ignatian Q, a conference for LGBTQ+ students from Jesuit schools from across the country. The protesters occupied the front rows of the church and began praying the rosary and singing before the Mass began. The conference leaders and I knew that this would be taking place and it was our policy for everyone to be welcomed, as long as the Mass itself was not disrupted. My one request from them was this: please move from the front of the church to make space for those attending the conference, since this Mass was for them. The spokesperson told me that they would not be moving. They also decided to keep singing as one of the students and leaders of the conference gave the welcoming announcements. After some tears and tension, the group in the front rows quieted down for the remainder of the liturgy.

This entire incident has me reflecting on the space that we make and the space that we take. I was moved at the beginning of the Ignatian Q conference when a speaker noted that many Catholic LGBTQ+ persons have trouble finding a space to belong. They are often told by some religious circles that they shouldn't be in LBGTQ+ spaces and they are told by some LGBTQ+ circles that they shouldn't be in religious spaces. The whole point of the conference was to help them find a space in both.

Those who protested the Ignatian Q Mass decided to take space away from students searching so desperately to find a space where they belonged. The response of some students was to take the space back. Some joined the young adults in praying the rosary, a reminder that Mary is a mother to us all. Some campus ministers, conference leaders, and Jesuits in clerics decided to occupy the row of seats directly in front of the protestors. If the message of the protestors was, "You don't belong here," the wall people in front of them said, "Yes, you do."

We have a big church, both literally and figurately. There is room for everyone who wishes to enter. Are we ready to make space for all? Do we place any conditions on being in this space? Do we ever think, "Not them," "Not there," or "Not like that"?

We must continue to work to make room, room in our church, room in our hearts, for all who seek to enter.

Living Our Faith: Meet Jonathan

An SFX parishioner since: 2018. I started coming to College Church after moving to St. Louis and beginning the RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation) process led by Joe Milner. Who is God and what does He want from me? That's the question Joe posed to me and my friends in RCIA (known as catechumens). Fortunately, the answer is revealed each time we open the good book, engage in prayer and celebrate Mass as a community. I was baptized and confirmed at SFX on Easter 2019.

Living my faith: Since I became Catholic here in St. Louis as an adult, I've loved growing and learning more about what it means to be Catholic. I'm drawn to the community here at College Church, and have to give a shout-out to my godmother, Sandra Spencer, who is such an inspiring role model for me. Love you, Sandy! I see all the wisdom, generosity and godliness in parishioners and leaders here, and want to follow their example. Since I don't have a lifetime of Catholic experience to draw on, they are helping me to catch up.

My faith is central to my identity and I live it out in a few fun ways. I've pinned various prayers and scripture readings that remind me to look to God around my desk at work. I review the daily bible readings emailed to me by the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops and occasionally listen to the Pray As You Go podcast. I participated in Light Works and learned the importance of discipline in spending time with God, something I'm still working on. And I'm active with the Young Professionals Group at College Church and have made friendships founded on a shared Christian mission. I love getting together with people my age to share our lives, explore our faith and have fun.

Why I'm involved: I made a conscious choice to pursue and grow a faith life, and it's a life-long journey. I made a commitment to love and worship God, to prune out the bad and cultivate the good. There are no days off and vacations from that commitment. Realizing that has been pretty radical and intimidating, but my relationship with God has been gentle, grace-filled and celebratory. It's a dialogue, a conversation, a relationship that I've been called to grow and nurture. Being involved and showing up at church are how I've chosen to pursue that relationship. I feel better about myself, my outlook on the world, and just a general sense of satisfaction with my life after Mass. A spiritual life is good for me!

Three words that describe SFX: Joyous, Risen, Beautiful.

My neighborhood: I live in Princeton Heights, south of Eichelberger between Kingshighway and Hampton. We like being under the radar in our little pocket of South City -- walking past pretty gingerbread houses with my dog, Lady, and stopping in our favorite bars and restaurants. A couple of Catholic parishes are nearby and I've attended Mass there occasionally, but I enjoy driving to College Church each Sunday because of the community and connections I've made here.

Fun facts: My family and I – including my mom, dad and younger sister –are from Round Rock/Austin, Texas, and I've lived, studied and worked in the South. But I've flown the coop and found a new home in St. Louis! I'm in a great relationship with a kind woman, Christen Heinsohn, who comes to church with me (say hi to us sometime!). I work for St. Louis Community College and love the connection to mission and community. I also enjoy soccer so much that I picked up a part-time job in Guest Services for St. Louis City SC and get a big grin each time I walk into the park. Riding bikes is another passion, and I took part last summer in a 500-mile ride that spanned the width of lowa. Adventure is out there!

Antiracism at College Church

At College Church, antiracism is an expression of our recognition that all are created in the image of God. As such, we respond—personally and collectively— to the call to identify, and to actively challenge, structures and systems that devalue people on the basis of race, and to practice restoration in the pursuit of justice.

And Justice for All?

Continuing to recognize May as Asian and Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islander Heritage month, today we examine the roots of injustice toward American descendants from those parts of the world. Discrimination in the U.S. against Asian people began very early. In 1854 a California court declared that testimonies of Chinese people were inadmissible in cases against white men. Over the next ninety years 17 more laws or verdicts would restrict the rights of Asian people in the U.S. – or prevent them from entering the country at all.

Most significant was The Chinese Exclusion Act of 1882, banning Chinese laborers from immigrating to the U.S. for 10 years. It was the first federal law ever to prohibit an entire ethnic group. The act also placed restrictions on Chinese workers already in the country. If they left, they had to get certification to re-enter. When the exclusion act expired, Congress extended it for 10 more years. It was made permanent in 1904, requiring every Chinese resident to carry a residence certificate or face deportation. Challenged in the Supreme Court, the certificate requirement "for Asians only" was upheld as constitutional (Fong Yue Ting v. US, 1892).

In 1908, President T. Roosevelt made a "gentleman's agreement" with Japanese leaders to not allow immigration of their own people. A 1917 Immigration Act created a zone around Southeast Asia from which no one could enter the U.S. Further Supreme Court verdicts affirmed that Asians could not be naturalized because they are not "white" (Ozawa v. US, 1922). After granting independence to the Philippines (a US territory), a 1934 Congressional act restricted Filipinos from entering the U.S., thus completing the exclusion of all Asians and Pacific Islanders. The culmination point was "Korematsu v. US" (1944) which upheld the government's right to incarcerate Japanese Americans as a "military necessity."

After World War I, Congress had adopted immigration quotas based on national origin, but not for Asian countries. But during World War II, China was an ally against Japan, so Congress repealed all exclusion acts. Chinese residents could seek naturalization for the first time, however, quotas limited Chinese immigrants to only 105 per year.

That system lasted until the Immigration Act of 1965 which set the maximum from any country at 20,000. Several laws since then have focused on refugees, e.g. the 1975 Indochina Migration & Refugee Assistance Act, which admitted 135,000 Vietnamese refugees fleeing the war.

Today, most immigrants come from Asia and Latin America. In 2011-2012, Congress unanimously condemned the Chinese Exclusion Act and affirmed civil rights and constitutional protections for all.

Classical Violinist, Scott Yoo

American conductor Scott Yoo is the Artistic Director and main Conductor for the Mexico City Philharmonic Orchestra.

Yoo was born in Tokyo in 1971 and grew up in Connecticut. His father was Korean and his mother was Japanese. Yoo began studying violin at age three and performed the Mendelssohn Violin Concerto with the Boston Symphony Orchestra at age 12. He studied at Juilliard, and by age 17 he had won an international violin competition in Brazil. As a violinist, Yoo has soloed with and conducted the Boston Symphony, Dallas Symphony, San Francisco Symphony, Colorado Symphony, Indianapolis Symphony, and New World Symphony (Miami Beach, FL). He made his Carnegie Hall debut conducting the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra.

A proponent of modern music, Yoo has premiered 79 contemporary works by 41 composers. In 2011, he founded the Medellín Festicámara in Colombia to bring together international artists with underprivileged musicians. In 2016, Yoo was hired by the Mexico City Philharmonic. In addition, he is host and Executive Producer of "Now Hear This," a music television program presented by Great Performances on PBS. The show was nominated for Emmy Awards in 2021 and 2023.

Yoo is married to flutist Dr. Alice Dade, a professor at the University of Missouri, and the couple lives in Columbia, MO.

For the last 24 months, the Antiracism Team at College Church has been engaged in our Parish Racial Equity Review. Applying the knowledge and tools learned through extensive training and formation with Crossroads Antiracism Organizing and Training, we have been examining the programs, policies, and practices of our parish and considering in what ways our actions may uphold and perpetuate systemic racism. All of this work has been undertaken to animate our parish vision to become an antiracist church.

We have now come to one of the most important steps in the review process. We want to hear from you—the members of the College Church community—about your perspectives and experiences. We invite you to share your thoughts through a survey that will be available beginning next week. Your responses to the survey are essential to the successful completion of the review and the development of recommendations for change.

Significant Figures in Racial History

Lorraine Hansberry – born May 19, 1930, in Chicago, IL. Hansberry is most famous for her play, "A Raisin In the Sun," the first play by an African American woman to be performed on Broadway. It was based on her family's experience of restrictive housing covenants in Chicago. Hansberry won the New York Drama Critics Circle Award for that play.

George Floyd, Jr - died May 25, 2020, in Minneapolis, MN. Floyd was an unarmed Black man who died because of brutality by a Minneapolis police officer during an arrest. His death spawned numerous protests for several months in cities throughout the U.S.

Third Q	uarter Finai	ncial Report


Our financial situation is better than expected as we enter the fourth quarter of our fiscal year. This is due to increased revenue in the following areas:

- Offertory giving grew \$55,000 (included in Unrestricted Revenue)
- Unbudgeted one time gifts (including a bequest) were received totaling \$45,000 (included in Unrestricted Revenue)
- Gala revenue was \$12,500 higher than expected (included in Other Revenues)
- Social Ministry was awarded unbudgeted grants totaling \$30,000 (included in Grant Revenue)
- Wedding revenue was higher than budgeted (included in Other Revenues)
- Received unbudgeted grant revenue totaling \$40,000 from our SLU building fund for renovations in the parish center (included in Grant Revenue). This is offset by unbudgeted costs for parish center renovations of \$40,000 which are included in Fees & Services and Occupancy.

Grand: Herbert Hoover Boys & Girls Club and St. Josephine Bakhita Catholic Church.

People can **recycle glass** via Ripple Glass [rippleglass.com/stl/]. Accepted items are glass food and beverage containers (all colors, labels can stay on), cosmetic bottles and jars; candle jars (leftover wax is OK). The website also makes clear what types of glass are not acceptable and indicates specifically where the Purple Bins for Ripple Glass are located in the St. Louis metro area.

Mary Mother of the Church has ongoing **metal recycling**. Items to be recycled include the following: Kitchen items: Utensils, pots and pans, blenders, mixers, toasters, coffee makers, microwaves; **Metal items:** Metal siding and shelving, bar BQ pits, lawn mowers, fans, dehumidifiers, chain saws, car parts, metal tools and lawn furniture; **General appliances:** Washers, dryers, stoves, dishwashers, refrigerators, freezers, AC units and furnaces. All items that are mostly metal can be recycled. Non-metal furniture, tires, and TVs cannot be accepted. Items can be dropped off at 5833 Kerth Road, 63128 at any time. All proceeds are donated to St. Vincent DePaul neighbors in need of support. If you have questions, call Dick at 314-374-4680.

Many of the products we use for household cleaning and personal care are sold in single-use plastic containers and/or have excess packaging. However, some brick and mortar stores locally and online sell products in bulk with refilling in non-plastic containers. If you google "refill personal and home care products," both online and local stores will probably come up. You can read about their packaging and systemismire refilling and decide if this is what you want to do to help minimize what goes into landfill or into plastic recycling where it probably is not actually getting recycled.

"Think that your plastic is being recycled? Thing again." is a highly informative article by Douglas Main published in the MIT Technology Review on October 12, 2023.

You can also google "plant based laundry sheets" to find alternatives to bulky plastic bottles of laundry detergent.
